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MAIN PROPOSAL

PROJECT TITLE: Cooperative development of fishing pier and shore fishing sites with local units of government

I. PROJECT STATEMENT

The overall goal of the fishing pier grant program is to improve fishing opportunities, especially for children, elderly, people with disabilities and those without a boat. On many lakes public shoreline areas open to angling opportunities are limited. Fishing piers and developed shore fishing areas support the recruitment and retention new and existing anglers. Fishing is a lifelong activity that connects participants with the outdoors. Fishing also encourages environmental stewardship and support of Minnesota's natural resource programs.

A survey of east metro lakes in 2003 showed that lakes that had fishing piers averaged 207 angler hours per acre from May through October. This was 33% higher than lakes that did not have piers, which averaged 138 hours per acre. Piers provide a means for anglers to cast into deeper water and into areas with good fish habitat.

Presently there are 305 fishing piers and 35 shore fishing sites statewide. 20% of the piers are aging beyond repair and becoming unsafe. Many of them will need to be removed if they are not replaced soon. There are 72 project applications for new and replacement fishing piers.

Fishing piers provide many positive impacts. They facilitate use by disabled anglers, elderly, and parents or grandparents with young children. They provide a safe and convenient place to fish, instead of from bridges, steep/rocky embankments or fragile shorelines. Piers can eliminate shoreline erosion from foot traffic and allow native aquatic habitat and vegetation to thrive. Fishing piers can easily facilitate fishing clinics such as those offered through MinnAqua and Fishing in the Neighborhood programs, which enhances the Departments outreach efforts. Piers can also be the heart of a community as a magnet for tourists and residents or a main component of a state, county or city park. Fishing piers can also help reduce the carbon footprint by providing an area for people to fish close to home or without a boat.

This request will provide 20 fishing piers and shore fishing sites state wide (half of these will be replacements). The DNR enters into cooperative agreements with the local units of government who provide the accessible walkway/path, accessible parking space and 20 years of ongoing maintenance while the state constructs the shore fishing site or provides the fishing pier.

III. PROJECT STRATEGY AND TIMELINE

A. Project Partners

Local Units of Government including Township, City & County, and local organizations such as lake associations, Lions Clubs, Kiwanis, angling associations, etc.

All of the individual projects have local unit of government (LUG) and/or local organizations as partners. The DNR enters into cooperative agreements with the local units of government who agree to provide the accessible walkway/path, accessible parking space and 20 years of ongoing maintenance at the site. In return the state will construct the shore fishing site or purchase and install the fishing pier. Often the partners are able to donate money towards the purchase of the pier or provide additional in kind services such as plantings, litter pick-up, picnic tables, benches, restrooms, or lighting.

B. Time

Funding required is \$700,000 or \$350,000 per year. 10 piers or shore fishing sites will be completed each year for a total of 20 sites. Cooperative agreements and purchase orders for the fishing piers will be completed in the winter months and the piers will be installed or shore fishing sites constructed during the summer months.

C. Long-Term Strategy

The DNR will continue to seek money from capital funding sources to ensure the long-term viability of the program. The popularity of the fishing pier program has been constant since 1984. It has resulted in the DNR granting 340 fishing piers and shore fishing sites statewide with 72 pending project applications.


