Project Summary: This project increases leadership capacity and access to immersive outdoor education experiences and curricula for people of all ages with an emphasis on engaging historically marginalized communities statewide.

Too many people, especially populations historically marginalized from outdoor spaces, do not have the access to experiences in nature. Now, more than ever, protection of Minnesota's wild spaces is important for the health and wellbeing of populations statewide. It is of the utmost importance that all Minnesotans have access to nature to be able to develop an understanding of how they personally benefit from time outdoors and their roles in advocating for the preservation and conservation of nature.

We find often that outdoor experiences are one-time opportunities for many populations who do not have the resources to regularly seek outdoor adventure. While providing a touchpoint with nature is an important first step, there is a gap in transference for how to make outdoor experiences repeatable. Our continuum of youth day, overnight and family camp offerings at the YMCA of the North provide immersive experiences in nature that include environmental education, advocacy and leadership development opportunities that result in a lifetime engagement with nature.

LCCMR funding will allow the YMCA to expand on previous LCCMR-funded programming by providing immersive outdoor experiences to young people and families, statewide. Through our leadership development and family programming curriculum participants will: (1) learn wilderness craft to create repeatable experiences at home, (2) gain an appreciation for Minnesota wilderness and understanding of environmental changes, (3) gain an understanding of native flora and fauna (4) develop lifelong leadership skills, and (5) increase belonging and representation by uniting diverse groups of people through shared outdoor experiences and learning.

Our programming, with an emphasis on leadership development and family engagement, will address a gap in knowledge and skills transference, supporting continued nature experiences and learning at home. These offerings, largely focus on wilderness trips (average 9 days), and week-long immersive family experiences which foster leadership development within outdoor recreation. This emphasis provides framework for caregivers to serve as leaders for their family by maintaining a connection to the outdoors at home and for young people to serve as stewards and advocates for the natural world within their communities at large.

We plan to serve 1500 individuals through our programming, year-round, with an emphasis on populations historically marginalized from outdoor recreation and education.

What are the specific project outcomes as they relate to the public purpose of protection, conservation, preservation, and enhancement of the state's natural resources?

Our outcome goals for participants are:

- 1. To instill understanding of the need to conserve Minnesota wilderness through immersive learning in nature for all ages
- 2. To provide leadership development experiences for young people and families that allow young people and families to steward their outdoor experiences and increase advocacy
- 3. To create experiences that foster the transfer of knowledge and skills gained related to outdoor education and recreation, to increase repeatable experiences at home and result in a lifetime of engagement with the outdoors.
- 4. To develop improved outreach and increased access to environmental education and recreation for communities

Activities and Milestones

Activity 1: Participant scholarships with an emphasis on engaging historically marginalized communities

Activity Budget: \$750,000

Activity Description:

This grant will support scholarships for 1500 participants, with an emphasis on populations historically marginalized from outdoor recreation and education, enabling them to participate in Y Adventure leadership development and family experiences, wilderness canoe and backpacking trips that average 9 days in length, in wild places throughout the state of Minnesota, including Boundary Waters Canoe Area, regional and state parks, St. Croix Riverway, Superior National Forest and the Iron Range. Our family programming offers introductory, multi-generational programming throughout the state. Full and partial scholarships will be awarded based on financial need and a focus on youth and families from marginalized communities. Application for scholarships may be done on-line, or in person by telephone with our friendly and helpful customer service department (language translation/assistance is also available). Scholarships (average \$500 per camper stay) support all lodging, meals, and activities for campers and camper families and for whatever length of stay they choose.

Activity 2: Leadership Development Internship Program for 15 young people annually, prioritizing youth from marginalized communities

Activity Budget: \$90,000

Activity Description:

The paid internship program invests in 15 young people annually who wish to explore careers in the outdoor industry. The 3-week program includes thorough training in the skills necessary to lead a wilderness trip including: social emotional learning, risk management, meal planning, care of equipment, how to teach skills to others. The program culminates with interns serving as trail counselors on trips.

Payment of the interns is of the utmost importance to making the internship accessible to teens who may otherwise not be able to participate in the program because they need to earn money during the summer months. Paying our interns further demonstrates the value we place in each of their unique contributions that they bring to the fabric of our communities. By investing in their growth and development, we believe it encourages interns to take on leadership roles within and outside of our programs, particularly pertaining to environmental programming, advocacy, and careers in the outdoor industry. Finally, we believe interns are important role models to inspire younger generations to also become stewards of wild spaces and communities, thereby changing the narrative around who belongs outdoors.

Activity 3: Gear/Equipment Libraries to meet the needs of participants from marginalized communities

Activity Budget: \$45,000

Activity Description:

YMCA outdoor leadership development programs operate year-round, serving a high volume of participants every year. One of our core beliefs is for programs to be accessible for anyone regardless of the resources (or lack of resources) to be able participate. Each of our family and leadership development sites are creating Gear Libraries containing necessary items to loan out to participants. The purpose is to ensure that everyone who participates has access to high-quality, industry supported outfitting options for safety and performance ability. In order to meet the needs of all participants, and to ensure a successful experience, we will restock and update our gear libraries annually to meet these needs and reduce barriers of underserved youth and families to participate. These items include but are not limited to: hiking gear, backpacks, sleeping bags, fleece, rain gear, footwear, water bottles, clothing. Currently we have 3 launch sites and will expand to six at the end of three years to include: Ely, Eveleth, Babbitt, Grand Marais, Credit Township and Lakeville.

Activity 4: Presenting conference attendance by lead staff to disseminate project outcomes and impacts

Activity Budget: \$9,000

Activity Description:

Two staff will present at the National Boys/Girls Outdoor Leadership Development conference. Every year, leaders from around the country gather to report on program outcomes, discuss findings, and plan as a collective for national impact for the following year. Our expectation is the Conference will take place in Minnesota in the next two years. Attendance as a presenter is mandatory. YMCA of the North represents and second largest program in the country. This conference provides an opportunity for our staff to share the work that LCCMR has funded, report our findings and provide value to the national learning experience of environmental education and leadership development. Funding is not given to veteran sites from the national level to support conference travel, even for presenters. We will send two staff presenters annually to the conference. Costs include travel, hotel stay, and meals.

Activity 5: Project Staffing for project implementation of all components (e.g. Internships, scholarship management, Gear Libraries, outreach, and evaluation

Activity Budget: \$240,000

Activity Description:

Program Director, .6 FTE (1.8 FTE over 3 years), \$108,000 has the oversight of all projects, manages community outreach for programs

Administrative Coordinator, .25 FTE (.75 FTE over 3 years), \$36,000 manages camp office, fields family and camper questions, processing of scholarships, and program applications (and the paperwork that accompanies participants - medical, permissions, transportation as needed, etc.)

2 Program Managers, .3 FTE (.9 FTE over 3 years for each), $$48,000 \times 2 = $96,000$, Direct program management for Interns, camper programs, wilderness trips, Gear Libraries, evaluation survey collection for each group. plus Fringe @ 25% \$60,000
