Ramsey County's Tamarack Nature Center has an exciting and impactful nature education program that boasts two owls, a barred and tawny owl, as a centerpiece of the program, providing a rare and unforgettable opportunity for Minnesotans in Ramsey, Washington and Anoka Counties to come into contact with a piece of Minnesota's wildlife legacy. The current raptor mew where the owls spend most of their time when not participating in programming is urgently in need of replacement due to ageing condition, and the facility is currently not designed to allow the public to view the owls except while actively involved in programming. Tamarack's highly trained raptor care staff, as well as county project managers and construction project experts stand ready to solve these issues with a new raptor mew if funding can be attained.

Tamarack Nature Center has a long-range plan that identifies replacement of the raptor mew, and in 2019 worked with Shelter Architects to develop concept drawings for the new raptor mew. The proposed facility will allow the public to view the raptors on a daily basis and allow for interpretive signs, giving tens of thousands of people opportunities to learn about these amazing birds and to see natural behaviors that can strengthen conversations around conservation that cannot be seen in other contexts. For the two owls currently in Tamarack's care (they are at Tamarack because they were deemed non-releaseable by a license rehabilitation vet) these proposed changes will better align with current industry standards for animal husbandry and quality of life. Funding through the Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund will enable the county to build a raptor mew that would provide better living conditions for the owls and future raptors, one additional stall for a total of three future raptors, provide improved facilities for the care of Minnesota's injured raptors, expanded programming opportunities, and perhaps the most impactful: the opportunity for the public to view the owls all year long, extending the benefit of contact with wildlife.

What are the specific project outcomes as they relate to the public purpose of protection, conservation, preservation, and enhancement of the state's natural resources?

Environmental education is the crucible for creating the conservationists of tomorrow, and there is almost nothing that has a visceral and lasting impact as an interaction with a live animal. Supporting facilities that can make these experiences a reality are fundamental to operating a humane and impactful animal ambassador program.

Tamarack's location in the Twin Cities has an added benefit of bringing these experiences to racially and ethnically diverse residents, diversifying the field of natural resources and education. People only conserve what they value and our raptor ambassadors make a powerful bridge between people and Minnesota's natural environment.

Activities and Milestones

Activity 1: Design

Activity Budget: \$20,000

Activity Description:

Current concept drawings developed in collaboration with Shelter Architects and staff will need to be brought to construction level drawings, then permitted and brought to RFP for contractors to build the raptor mew. Construction would complete in 2026.

Activity 2: Construction

Activity Budget: \$120,000

Activity Description:

Grading, foundation and construction, adding owl mew onto current building. Close-out activities, including punch list items, ENRTF language and logo installed, and opened to the public for viewing.

Activity 3: Migrate owls to mew, promotion of owl viewing and program expansion

Activity Budget: \$10,000

Activity Description:

A new raptor mew offers enormous opportunities for Minnesotans living near Tamarack Nature Center to view the owls in a way that they have not had the opportunity to in the past due to limitations of the current owl mew. Advertising and promotion of the owls in the new owl mew will be a positive draw to the nature center and new programming can be built around the current owls without the need to handle the owls. Next steps can look at the addition of a raptor in the third stall of the raptor mew and staff can work with the raptor rehabilitation facilities to identify injured birds that may need permanent care for this purpose.

Long-Term Implementation and Funding

This grant would provide the capital needed to build the raptor mew. A 25% cost share of \$50,000 has been identified in Ramsey County's Regional Park Operations & Maintenance funds and accounted for in the 2024-25 budget. The Parks and Recreation's planning division's current resources can be used for project management. Ongoing funding is currently built into the operating budget, and the current raptor mew requires an increasing amount of maintenance costs, so a new raptor mew would likely cost the department less maintenance and operations funding.

Gus manages many of the Ramsey County parks system planning, design, and construction projects, as well as leads internal design, construction, and permitting. Gus was the project manager leading the multi disciplined design team through improvement plans for the final phase of the Tamarack Nature Center buildout in 2016-2020. In addition, Gus is a registered professional Landscape Architect in the state of Minnesota.
